The Bay Horse has new licensees. They are Jon and Tina Clarke who have moved to the village from Menston near Otley. They pulled their first pints at the pub on 4 November and are now gearing up for a busy Christmas.

"As soon as I drove around the corner to see the pub for the first time I was taken with it and on the phone to the brewery straight away to find out more," Jon, pictured, told Village View. "Being in such a large and vibrant village the potential of the pub is plain to see. I'm really excited about the prospect of running the Bay Horse even though its my sixth pub. My wife, Tina, and I are very much in it for the longterm, hopefully until retirement. Thanks to everyone for their warm and friendly welcome."

He added: "We aim to put the Bay Horse right at the heart of the village. Our plan is for a pub for locals that serves food rather than a restaurant. We're also keen to support local suppliers wherever possible. We'll be buying our meat from the farm shops and have already had the kind offer of apples for apple



pie from the Hagues and John Lambert in the village!"

Jon, originally a welder, and Tina entered the pub trade in 1989 when, at just 23 years old, they became the youngest managers for Tetley's brewery. Jon is a keen chef and loves to prepare homemade, quality pub grub. He also enjoys darts, dominoes, poker and football although he's not allowed to play anymore after too many broken bones! Tina is a qualified hotel manager and,

after re-training 12 years ago, now works full-time at St Aidan's School in Harrogate teaching Maths in KS3 and alternative curriculum courses in years 10 and 11. Taking the lead on the hotel side of the business and paperwork, Tina also enjoys gardening and creating hanging baskets and garden displays.

The couple have two sons. Ryan, 20, is in his final year reading Geography at Liverpool Hope University. A keen guitarist, he enjoys 'open mic' nights and will help out at the pub during vacations. Callum, 16, is currently completing a British Gymnastics apprenticeship in Leisure Management and coaching at Harrogate Gymnastics. He works part-time in the pub and also enjoys cooking and baking in between competing nationally in tumbling and team gym competitions. Callum was ranked 10th in his age group last year at national qualifiers but unfortunately broke his ankle at the British qualifiers in April. After a few months without training he is now back to full fitness.

The family has a seven-year-old German Shepherd called Casper. They adopted him as a rescue dog six months ago after losing their dog to cancer suddenly. "He can be quite nervous of other dogs so please respect his yellow 'nervous' lead if you see us out and about," said Tina.

Jon and Tina are currently serving food and drinks daily and will be open over the holiday period including Christmas Day when drinks will be available for 11am to 2pm and a four-course lunch at 3pm. They offer a 10% discount on B&B rates for friends and families of the village. They will relaunch the pub website soon. Shop and PO refurb in New Year

Long overdue refurbishment of the shop and post office gets underway in the New Year. Plans include:

- New open plan, welcoming counter to the left as you enter the shop.
- Fridges to be moved to where the post office counter is currently positioned.
- All shelving to be upgraded with Yorkshire-made artisan crates, creating a rustic, country style.

The new configuration will boost display space by about 30%.

As much of the work relates to the post office side of the business we will need to close from Wed 4 Jan to Fri 20 Jan inclusive. We are making arrangements to continue with newspaper deliveries but regrettably all other services will cease for this period. There is no further update on the status of the sorting office and until the future is clearer all plans for the café will have to remain on hold.

We currently have an urgent requirement for assistance with newspaper delivery on Thursday and Friday mornings. The role would suit anyone with a free hour and energy in the early morning such as teenagers, stay at home parents or community elders. If you are interested please contact me on 331062. Some customers are less able and value a newspaper being delivered to their homes. Without delivery support this service will be under threat.

We have introduced mixed cases of six red wines for Christmas, all from our bestselling range personally selected by Ingrid and I. Last Tango in Green Hammerton was performed by the GHRC Players to two full houses at the village hall over Remembrance weekend. The one-act comedy concerned a struggling village amateur dramatic society's attempts to boost audience numbers by promoting a new, racy play. Flyers around the both the village in the script and Green Hammerton stated: "Adults only. This play contains scenes of nudity which may shock or offend." Reality was further blurred with fiction as Dougie Mack, the Kirk & Green Hammerton WI, the Ainsty Farm Shop, Flora the cat (see back page), Sue Holden and even Liz Powley's legendary ginger biscuits all found their way into the plot.

David MacDonald, playing Gordon, the outgoing chair of the am dram society, makes all sorts of promises that he doesn't intend to fulfill. His louche ambitions are aided – or should that be abetted? - by the other three other committee members. Bernie (played by Loretta Smith), the cynical set builder, rolls her eyes in disbelief as the ploy of Gordon's plot becomes evident

but can see the sense in the "sex" strategy. Striking a balance between prim and brazen Margaret (Helen Walsh) considers stripping off as rehearsals progress and the premiere nears. Meanwhile, musicals nut Joyce (Claire Jeffrey), takes it all lying down in the bath while getting carried away singing Don't Cry for Me, Argentina (as pictured), one of the highlights of a rumbustious evening both on and off the stage. Fittingly and in reality Claire won a raffle prize of Liz Powley's ginger biscuits on the second night.

Helen said after the show: "People around the village asked me how it was going and I said that the easiest part was taking my clothes off and the hardest was learning the lines!" So what exactly did happen? Ah, well. You had to be there!

The play was directed by Chris Turner with support from Badapple Theatre and Sue Holden and costumes by Rita Horner. It was followed by an excellent supper provided by Malcolm Horner, Sally Morrill, Sally Walker, Jane Bannan, Lindsay Councell, Rachael Holloway, Chris Turner, Sue Holden, Liz Powley and Carole Rutter. The meat and potatoes were supplied by the Ainsty Farm Shop.

What a fantastic night out. It was obvious from the performance that the cast were very dedicated and committed to the production and they provided tremendous entertainment.

Chris Turner adds: We took a chance by putting on this play on two consecutive nights and much to our relief it was a complete sell-out with people left on the waiting list! It's very gratifying for the little group of people that dared to put their heads above the parapet to entertain everyone to know that their efforts have not been in vain. We made a total of £1,237, donating £650 to the scanner appeal (see p7) and the balance to the Green Hammerton Recreational Charity. Remembrance event strikes a chord

Margaret and I decided to attend this concert because we do believe in attending village events. We did not even fully realise that we would be entertained by two combined choirs which share the same choral director, Catherine Field-Leather.

Our expectations were increased when we realised that some Collavoce singers had recently joined from the disbanded Kirk Hammerton Singers which we knew well. In contrast the other choir was completely new to us. Neither Margaret nor I would claim that this kind of music is our favourite nor that we could really understand all the intricacies of the music and singing. But what matters is did we enjoy it and did it fulfil its aims?

We would have to give a resounding yes to both questions. The quality of the singing certainly exceeded our expectations. The musical entertainment was supplemented by readings which added tremendously to the occasion. We realised they had been specially chosen but they had to be read well and they were.

All in all, it was interesting, thought provoking and enjoyable afternoon; a tremendous act of remembrance. We almost even forgot about the hardness of the pews after 20 minutes! We shall certainly keep an eye out for future performances.

Medieval ring unearthed near village

An amateur treasure hunter discovered a precious Tudor ring near Green Hammerton and has sold the "extra-ordinarily rare" piece of jewellery for a five-figure sum. Lee Rossiter found the ring using a cheap metal detector he had bought on eBay. The 15th century ring is 80% gold and contains a ruby and an emerald.



Mr Rossiter discovered the ring while searching with the Yorkshire Searchers Metal Detecting Club in April 2015. He said: "I got really excited. So far I had only found the odd silver coin but this looked like a proper piece of jewellery, which seemed to be made of gold.

"One of my friends said it was far too yellow to be real gold and looked like costume jewellery, I should just throw it away. But the ring was relatively heavy and I thought I'd better ask our dig organiser, Stuart Littlewood. Luckily he confirmed that this was definitely an antique ring, most likely Tudor Gold."

The ring, which is a double-bezel chased finger ring in the form of a flower is set with a ruby and an emerald and is engraved in medieval French. Scans at the British Museum showed the ring was 78-80 per cent gold and confirmed the nature of the precious stones. The jewellery worn in Medieval Europe reflected a hierarchical and status-conscious society. Royalty and the nobility wore gold, silver and precious gems.

The ring was classified as treasure but local museums were not able to raise the funds. Cheshire-based auctioneer Mark Littler advised him to sell directly to a collector rather than go through an auction.



Mr Littler said: "I was excited when Lee first approached me as medieval jewellery is more often found in museums, not fields. I knew immediately that this was an important find and would require some thought as to how best to sell it. It was decided that

an auction might not be the best course of action as the ring would be worth more to a private collector if it had not already been presented to the market." He said he brokered a sale with dealers Wartski, in Mayfair, who have been supplying the royal family with jewellery for generations. "I contacted them and negotiated a private treaty sale for a five-figure sum for my client which was a great result," Mr Littler said.

Kieran McCarthy, director of Wartski, said: "We have a strong interest in medieval rings and were thrilled to have the opportunity of purchasing this one. Jewels of this calibre are extraordinarily rare and it is magical when the ground presents them as gifts to those who look for them."

Parish council bulletin

The parish council has arranged a special meeting in the village hall on Tues 6 Dec at 7.30pm to discuss the proposed Harrogate local plan. The roadshow will have called at Green Hammerton the previous week. Your views, and those of other parishes, will be very welcome. These plans will determine the way the village develops over the next 15 years or so.

Plans to develop the Linden Homes/Yardley site are about to go to Harrogate District Council. The parish council is against this development in its present form and believes the project needs re-evaluating. The matter is now in the hands of the District planning committee. Over the next few months work will take place in Meadow Vale. Two houses will be built where the garages are now and the road in front of numbers one to 14 will be improved.

Many of you will be aware that The Green, a valuable open space, was owned by Mr Leather and Mr Hetherton. Angela Taylor now owns Mr Leather's share and she has proposed giving it to the parish council. We are in the process of finding out exactly what is involved and how best to move this exciting venture forward.

Alistair Taylor and a number of volunteers have responsibility for maintaining Helenfield. This year they will continue the winter management tasks on Sun 11 and Wed 14 Dec. Work starts at 10am and finishes about 3 pm but volunteers do not need to be present all the time. Even an hour is very beneficial to the project. Stout boots and working gloves are needed plus long-handled pruners or loppers if you have any. 

School soon into Christmas spirit


