John's story

John Clapham is one four people from Green Hammerton who died in the Great War. They are commemorated within a stained glass window in St Thomas' Church. Katharine Calvert (née Mack) tells his story based on her family's ongoing research.

John Thomas Edmund Clapham, my great, great uncle, was born in Green Hammerton in July 1899 to John and Mary Clapham. They were licensees of the Bay Horse and John Senior also ran a cycle works in the cottages opposite the pub. John Junior had three siblings, two of whom died in childhood. His older sister, Alice (my mother's grandmother), was born in 1892. John Senior died in 1905 but Mary continued to run the pub as a family business until her death seven years later. Alice then took over with husband Sam Mison (a touring farmhand from Norfolk) and other family members.

In 1917 at the age of 18 John Clapham was recruited by the army in York, joining the Prince of Wales's Own regiment. He became Private Clapham 53570 of the 21st battalion of the West Yorkshire regiment and, like many others, trained at Brocton Camp in Staffordshire.

Alice records in her notebook that he came home on sick leave during December 1917 and also returned the following February. The last entry we have so far of John coming home was recorded in March 1918 after which he departed for France. Our research also shows he spent time in Flanders.

Just days before Armistice Day, on the 29 Oct 1918 at the tender age of 19 John died of wounds received in action in France. He is buried in the small Bermerain Communal Cemetery in northern France. Tragically, Alice died just 17 days later of pneumonia and influenza. Who knows what effect John's death had on her as her notes clearly show a fondness of him. John was posthumously awarded the Victory and British War Medals as well as a citation and bronze plaque from King George.

Village could help boost government cycling targets

Last issue I proposed that a great legacy of the Tour de France would be a safe cycle route from Green Hammerton to Thorpe Underwood. By upgrading one of the three existing rights of way we could join the quiet back road to Aldwark Bridge and meet National Cycle Route 65 to York, the Moors and the Way of the Roses. There's been a positive response from families in the village with many offers of help, expertise and support coming in. The idea was also given enthusiastic backing at the recent parish council meeting.

I'm now talking to people who are in a position to help us at North Yorkshire County Council, Harrogate Borough Council and Sustrans, creators of the national cycle network. It turns out that our approach is very timely. In October the Department for Transport (DfT) published its draft cycling delivery plan which quotes the Prime Minister saying he wants to "kickstart a cycling revolution to remove the barriers for a new generation of cyclists". The plan's ambition is to double the amount of cycling in the UK. In November the department held a consultation in York which I attended along with 50 people from local councils, cycling charities and lobby groups. The consultation's leader, DfT's Naomi Green, talked us through the government's plans. She mentioned health benefits, the economic value of an innovative cycling industry and related tourism, the environmental benefits, and, underlying it all, she said: "Cycling safety is critical to everything we do".

The finalised cycling delivery plan will be published by the DfT towards the end of this year and then our local councils will be invited to put forward proposals that suit their particular areas. I came away optimistic that our idea of a safe cycle route fitted in with what's wanted. It will give children the chance to develop cycling confidence in safety, give families in Green and Kirk Hammerton a safe way into a network of great cycling routes and mean that pupils and teachers from Queen Ethelburga's who live in the village can cycle to school in no danger from rush-hour traffic. A route will be a lasting benefit to our community.

Now we know there's solid support for cycling from

every level of government and the potential to fund schemes that fit their aims I'm going to find out what interest there is from the local landowners whose land is crossed by the three rights of way. The step beyond that is to develop a feasibility study and a costing. I'm building a mailing list of everyone who has voiced their support for the idea of the Hammerton safe cycle route. Soon it would be a good idea for us to get together and work out how to make the route happen. Co-ordinators briefed by police chiefs

Insp Ed Noble and Supt Mike Walker of North Yorkshire police recently gave a presentation to Neighbourhood Watch co-ordinators about the future police operational model. The main points included:

- The North Yorkshire police manpower requirement is 1,392 officers plus 183 communications officers. Front line officer numbers will be ringfenced at the expense of management posts to achieve budget cuts.
- There is a new strategy for investigating routine crimes by telephone investigation by experienced officers. This is claimed to be much more effective than sending constables out to investigate and enables many more incidents to be dealt with faster.
- As most crime in our county is committed by criminals from outside it there will be a large investment in additional automatic number plate recognition equipment to help detect incomers' movements and interception.


At village level the simple message at this time of year is be vigilant. Protect your property by having some of your house lights on timers making it look like you are at home. Most attempted break-ins are opportunistic so why publicise you are not at home? Plug-in timers are very inexpensive so there is no excuse.


