Planning objections stack up

A big thank you to everyone who wrote to Harrogate Borough Council to object to plans by Loxley Homes to build 80 houses on prime agricultural land down New Lane. Alan Smith (pictured, below), who is part of the Keep Green Hammerton Green Action Group, delivered 85 objections ahead of the deadline which, in addition to the 190 objections already received, made a total of 275 lodged complaints about the proposed. Our thanks too to Chris and the team at the post office who gathered objections from villagers.



There was also a brilliant response to the Harrogate Borough Council draft plan consultation. Nearly 600 response forms objecting to it were completed by local residents and delivered to the council ahead of the deadline. The Keep Green Hammerton team, in association with Keep Kirk Hammerton Green, also submitted a group response supported by your petition which is available on the reports page of the group's website, kghg.co.uk.

We now need to bring in and fund expertise to assist us as we prepare our case against this new 3,000 settlement for presentation to the inspectorate. School report

from teachers at Green Hammerton Primary School

Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools (SIAMS) *by Miss Langley*

Redrow project by Miss Sanderson

Last term children from years three to six teamed up with Redrow Homes to design a bedroom for one of the show homes in the village. The children enjoyed a walk in the village, drawing inspiration from nature and came up with some brilliant ideas. The children were invited to the Redrow site in February for the grand unveiling of the show homes and to see their ideas in the bedroom that they had helped to design. Some children even cut the red ribbon to officially open the property! Following on from this year five and six

children wrote promotional pieces for the show homes and a selection of this work was shared with the Redrow team. As a thank you for all of the pupils' hard work, Redrow very kindly presented us with a cheque for £250 (see pic, above). We would like to once again thank them for their generosity and the opportunity to work with them.

Emma Brindley, national interior design manager for Redrow, said: "The children's artwork was amazing and translated really well into the bedroom design. For example, we have used bark pattern wallpaper as there was a lot of reference to trees, twigs and bark. We've also incorporated two large paintings of leaves, inspired by the beautiful drawings of leaves and also the collages which used leaves and sticks. We have vases on the window sill and mounted boxes on the wall filled with greenery and nature that were also inspired from the school's nature walk."


Theatre under threat

I am a theatre writer and director who moved to Green Hammerton in 2003, bringing with me a national touring theatre company which is now based in the centre of the village. Admittedly, for a few years we flew under the radar but then donated a performance to the fundraising for the new village hall and it was safe to say the secret was out. Since then we have continued to put down roots. We now work with other community projects and run a weekly youth theatre, theatre summer school for young people that draws participants from across the country, weekly junior

football session, theatre and dance sessions in schools as well as provide technical support and training for the local amateur companies and put on 120 performances a year as far afield as Devon and northern Scotland!

This year we celebrate 20 years of touring and just after Easter embark on a 45-date tour of Amy Johnson. This play couldn't be more timely, inspired by one of Yorkshire and England's greatest air pioneers, and a reimagining of the show that launched Badapple at the Edinburgh Festival in 1998. We have weathered some stiff economic times these past two decades and now no longer have any Arts Council support which is is putting all our projects under threat. At the moment we are working hard to ring-fence the youth projects so they are able to continue unhindered and draw on a skeleton budget on our professional projects. I only mention this because some friends in the village have suggested there maybe some among you who are able to help.



We're currently looking for corporate sponsors or private individuals to consider becoming friends of the company and donating to the many projects we organise. Stroll into springtime

We've all trudged the Kirk loop (as we call it) scores of times. For a different route from Green Hammerton try this gem that follows little used paths on the far side of Helenfield. It gets muddy so save it for a dry spell.

From the village plinth cross over the road and walk down New Lane to Helenfield. Enter the nature reserve and, at the stone bench, turn right and down to a stile.





Go over it and turn left, keeping the hedge to your right. Go over another stile and cross the field heading

just to the left of a white house. At the far side of the field turn left, passing a fingerpost. Beside a stile cross the next field in an 11 o'clock direction heading for a fence. Go over the stile and continue ahead between the trees (a nice peaceful spot), keeping the fence to your right. Pass through a gate within a larger metal gate and set off in a 10 o'clock direction across the next field aiming just to the left of the row of six trees.

At the furthest tree you have a choice. You can either turn right to cross a stile within a short wooden fence and turn left on the gravel track all the way to the bottom of the village green. Alternatively, keep ahead towards a metal gate. Immediately to the right cross a tiny, concealed footbridge over a dried up stream. Keep ahead with the barbed wire fence to your left. Pass through a metal gate and, at the end of the field, through a wooden gate to the left. Beware: this corner is often very muddy. Keep ahead up a broad track into the village.

<u>Distance</u>: 2.7 miles for the alternative route and slightly longer if you use the gravel track.

<u>Time</u>: 1 hour.

Parish council news

The elections for the parish council take place on Thu 5 May. Please consider standing as a councillor. Further information from our clerk, Louise Pink, via greenhammertonparishcouncil@gmail.com or from the chairman, Ian Bailes, via i.bailes@btinternet.com.

We were delighted to welcome two new councillors, Lucy Lui and Chris Jackson. They are well aware that their present tenure on the council will be short due to the imminent election but we look forward to working with them.

The revised Harrogate Borough Council (HBC) plan for the development of at least 3,000 houses in this area is now under review. Developer CEG presented its proposals at a meeting in the village hall and may submit them separately if they cannot get agreement with HBC. The public consultation has been completed. The results will be sent to an independent planning consultant appointed by the government. The Keep Green Hammerton Green and Keep the Hammertons Green groups arranged for survey forms to be completed by parishioners and these views have been passed on to the appointed officer.

Loxley Homes have submitted revised plans for a development of 80 houses in the field between New Lane and the A59 with access via New Lane. Objections to this plan have been submitted by the parish council and many residents. It is also possible that Strata Homes will submit a plan to build a further 75 houses on the left hand side of New Lane with the intention, again, to use New Lane for access. HBC has been made aware that New Lane is unsuitable for any notable increase in traffic and the entrance from New Lane into York road is on a potentially very dangerous bend. Redrow have now opened three show houses (see story p3). Linden Homes has a sales office on its site but no completed houses yet.

Concern was expressed regarding a number of traffic issues around the village. These included cars parking near the Harrogate Road/York Road junction on the corner opposite The Green and outside the school which is particularly dangerous before and after school. It was agreed to invite a representative of the police to attend either the annual parish meeting (last week) or the regular meeting on Fri 27 April. We hope you will join us too.

Some road repairs have been carried out in the village but many have been left. We are trying to find out what is actually happening and when all the repairs will be completed. The new road in Meadow Vale has now been started.

Litter has been removed from the A59 but not from the B6265. This situation will be brought to the attention of HBC. A meeting has been held with the contractors to arrange the grass cutting sequence for this year. The pruning of the trees on The Green is to be discussed with the land owner. North Yorkshire County Council and the Ramblers Association have been informed about a blocked public footpath.

 St Thomas's Church fabric committee has been busy with the help of local farmer Patrick Watson tidying up the yew hedge running down to the school (see pic, above), reports Steve Approximately four feet was taken off the top and then the rubbish cleared and road edges and graves tidied up. The committee also pruned several other trees within the graveyard that had become a hazard due to low branches. The committee is also in the process of arranging for the main stained glass window behind the alter to be repaired. Plaster and cement holding the window in place is missing in some places and a specialist firm has been hired to complete the repairs. This is a very costly process which is paid for by the fabric committee hence our fundraising activities. Any help towards the costs would be much appreciated. or around the wrist. Once the pendant is activated a call will be made to our call centre handlers who will take appropriate action." More information via 01423 500600 or lifeline@harrogate.gov.uk.

• The Beast from the East has bought to these shores large numbers of **fieldfare and redwing**, reports ornithologist Roger Mattock. He said: "These birds are winter migrants and members of the thrush family and about the same size as a blackbird. Normally they gather in flocks on fields but, due to snow, they were unable to find food which has brought them into

gardens. Sighting with photos have been numerous on the Yorkshire Birds and Birders Facebook site. I have had a pair of fieldfare visiting my garden, attracted by the apples put out for the blackbirds"
