Parish council update

We are closely involved in the consultation for the proposed Maltkiln development and will shortly be circulating documentation provided by Harrogate Council to enable and encourage villagers to express their views.

Several councillors have been much engaged with county councillor Arnold Warneken to try to resolve the problems with road closures that have cropped up from time to time. The major road works appear to be completed for now! An electronic 30mph speed warning sign will shortly be installed opposite the junction with St Thomas's Way.

Funds provided in connection with planning consents for the new estates have been identified and £25,000

allocated to the cycle way which should now move to the next, planning stage. More news in the next issue. Meanwhile, the planning application for remodelling the plinth opposite the Bay Horse has been submitted.

The village website has been resuscitated thanks to Chris Holloway and contributions are now invited. See Chris's article, below. It is up to villagers how they wish to populate and use their website which will be linked to the parish council website.

The mundane but important work of organising grass cutting, commenting on village planning matters and dealing with concerns raised by residents continues on a day to day basis. A meeting with Harrogate Borough Council is being arranged to review the recent litter bin regime changes.

Next month will see us start work on next year's budget and, eventually, the precept. In the difficult financial climate we will strive to find a balance between minimising our element of the council tax and having sufficient funds to serve the village effectively.

Over 80 years ago my great grandfather, Richard Powley, was a very successful showman, being the head herdsman for the Duke of Westminster in Alford, Cheshire. He regularly showed pedigree Dairy Shorthorn and pedigree Jersey cattle at major shows all over the UK and Ireland. My grandad, Tom, was also a regular on the show circuit in his younger years, assisting my great grandfather with the Dairy Shorthorns and Jerseys in the ring, as well as working for the Duke over his summer holidays before moving to Yorkshire and settling to create our own beef herd at Oak House Farm at the bottom of the green in Green Hammerton alongside my father Mike.


Fast forward to 2022 and a lot has changed about the Powleys and their cattle. I doubt all those years ago that Richard would have thought that his great granddaughter would be showing her young pedigree South

Devon bull in the ring at the Great Yorkshire Show! Our young bull, Oak House Chieftain ('Chiefy' at home) was extremely successful in the ring. He was named a reserve junior champion and reserve male champion, achieved a second and a special commendation for the best young bull and won rosettes in group events too. He was led by my father, Mike, in the grand parade in the main ring while I took the breed champion, Enterprise Chephira.

Throughout the week Chiefy was impeccably behaved. At only 15 months old and weighing over 750kg if he threw a toddler tantrum, I would know about it! Luckily, we had all of our strops out of the way before he went to Harrogate. His favourite part of the show was his daily baths down at the wash complete with a full shampoo and set with clay to get him looking pristine. I think he loved the attention! Now back at home, he is living out the rest of his summer in the field with his girlfriends but he still comes up to the house every evening for his back scratches and tickles.

It is an honour to be the fourth generation of Powleys to show at the Great Yorkshire and to see that the passion for cattle and farming has been passed down through the years too.

Talking shop

from the Havela team

After waiting patiently for three months we have eventually received listed building planning permission to make the café open plan to the shop.

Building works have therefore started with investigations into the rear 77cm thick wall. It appears to contain an old chimney but we are still none the wiser as to how this was used or when it was decommissioned. residents have knowledge of how the rear of the premises were used in the distant past we would be very interested to find out more. We are fairly sure there will have been a brick structure of some sort attached to the building as there was the chimney stack in place at one time and that will not have been part of the current flat roof.

The rest of the building works commence in earnest at the end of October. We will, of course, minimise disruption to the shop and post office which is entering a very busy period leading up to Christmas. The kitchen design is underway, fixtures and fittings will be ordered in due course and external landscaping is planned for February next year.

Our target is to open next spring with a possible prior soft opening to test the menu and café service and processes.
